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THE SUPREME COURT: A BEHIND THE SCENES TOUR

For the third time in five years a short course devoted to the Supreme Court of the United States will be held at the High Court on Wednesday, August 29th, 1984. The seminar will be held under the auspices of the American Political Science Association and will be begin at 10:00 am and end at 4:30 pm.

The use of this seminar for opening the Court to political scientists originated in conversations with Sam Krislov and Malcolm Feeley during my first year's work at the Court. Last minute arrangements made during the convention in 1977 led to a tour of the Court building coupled with a small reception. The enthusiasm of those who came, and the interest express by many who did not, led to the one-day short courses when the APSA met in Washington again in 1979 and 1980.

Let me exmphasize that the following description of this year's short course should be considered *tentative*. No matter how carefully or poorly such occasions are planned in Washington, there inevitably proves to be a good deal of last-minute scrambling and re-arranging. I suspect that this year's session will not be an exception. In addition, the process of making arrangements is more cumbersome, now that I have been gone from the Court for three years.

This year's course resembles, but does not replicate, its predecessors. It will begin with a tour of the building. Then the Librarian of the Supreme Court, Roger Jacobs, will discuss the library's collection, the information resources available to the Justices, and the usage of the Library. Toni House, a former reporter of the (Washington) *Evening Star*, and the Court's Public Information Officer, will discuss the relationship of Court and press from her perspective. We will then pause for lunch.

After lunch, Mark Cannon, Administrative Assistant to the Chief Justice and a political scientist, will discuss recent developments in federal judicial administration from the perspective of his office. Among his subjects will be the annual seminars in Williamsburg sponsored by the Brookings Institution which involve the Chief Justice, the Attorney General, members of the Judicial Conference, and members of the Judiciary Committees of both Houses of the Congress. We will then turn to the role of law clerks and chat with one of the most articulate and interesting clerks to recently serve the Court. I shall then have something to say about the "folkways" of the institution and also about some under-utilized materials which are helpful for teaching about the Supreme Court.

There will probably be at least one more speaker, perhaps two. In previous years one of the Justices met with our group. While I am optimistic that this will occur again, I would hope that everyone is aware that the week of our annual convention is just about the most difficult week of the year (outside, of course, of May and early June) to secure a Justice. Since, as you know, the Court now convenes to dispose of the summer's accumulation of business the week in advance of "the first Monday in October," all members tend to be working full throttle in the building for several week previous. Our pre-Labor Day convention thus occurs during their last realistic opportunity for a few days off.

While I worked at the Court, I liked to think that I was of some small assistance to scholars -- political scientists especially -- in making the building, its personnel, and its resources somewhat more accessible. This year I am conducting our session as "emeritus" or outsider. It offers me as well, therefore, a personel homecoming, and access to at

least some facilities and persons I have seen relatively little of since I returned to college teaching. I do hope, therefore, that this year's session will hold value for all of us.

Law and Social Sciences Program National Science Foundation

The 1985 budget request transmitted to Congress this past February includes a 1.7 million allocation for the Law and Social Sciences Program (21.4% increase over FY 1984). This is a favorable signal to the law and social sciences community regarding the importance and quality of its scholarly work. The program continues to support research aimed at advancing the scientific knowledge base about law and human behavior. The program has an "open-window" for investigator-initiated research, with full peer review given to all proposals. Research on judicial decisionmaking, dispute processing, procedural justice, compliance and deterrence, modeling jury deliberations, legal and social change, the regulatory role of law, legal socialization, and the legal profession are among the many areas that have recently received program support.
